

fabric, please consider this project and offer for fabric.


Frederick Memorial Hospital receives operating room equipment wrapped in a blue nonwoven cloth (double layer of a nonwoven fabric like many supermarket shopping bags). This fabric is soft and very strong. An employee from the operating room called me to offer this fabric for walker caddies and/or tote bags. Over the holidays I took a bag of it and made samples. It is easy to cut and sew and if you have a serger, it is a quick and easy project! See photo:

I was able to cut FOUR of the Care Wear Volunteers walker caddies (shown at right) from one double-layer piece of the blue nonwoven fabric.

This pattern is found on page 53 of the revised Pattern & Information Book and on page 54 of the older edition (yellow cover— January 2004 edition).

It is easy to adjust this pattern to create a walker caddie that wraps over the handle of the walker and fastens with Velero.

Using my serger, I serged the horizontal upper edge, then




Instead of tossing this fabric into the trash, it will be collected and I will pick it up at the hospital. If you live in the Frederick area, please contact me to stop by the office to pick up a supply. If you would like me to mail some, let me know. LUCKILY, the fabric is light weight. I am sure that nursing homes and other hospitals would welcome having free walker caddies to distribute to patients who are new to walkers and wheel chairs. Frederick Memorial Hospital (Attn: Volunteer Services, 400 West Seventh Street, Frederick MD 21701) welcomes walker caddies.

Note: I used leftover ribbon (Pink with bow, grey, white, and blue) on my samples. Gender neutral colors would be ideal, but you can use what you have on hand. Ribbon should be at least 1/2" wide. You could make ties using the blue fabric, too. Velcro fasteners at the ends would be easy to close and would stay secure. down the center for two equal-size pockets, too.


This walker caddie pattern (with directions) is on the website (www.carewear.org) in the PATTERNS section on page 53 of the revised 2012 Pattern & Information Book that is posted in pdf format. NOTE: It is simple to make the pockets on this caddie deeper. Before cutting out the fabric, lengthen the pattern 4"-8".

For another style of walker caddie, please turn to the next page (page 6) for the saddlebag style caddie that Frederick Memorial Hospital likes to use. The pockets on this caddie are deeper and the caddie is positioned over the handlebar of the caddie and fastened with a 3-inch piece of Velcro. 5





FREDERICK MEMORIAL HOSPITAL WALKER CADDIE


Here is the saddlebag-style walker caddie bag with deeper pockets. Pattern dimensions and directions are below. This caddie is cut from the free blue nonwoven fabric that is recycled from the Operating Room of Frederick Memorial Hospital. Please consider making walker caddies for FMH or your local hospital, nursing home, or rehab center.












- 1. Cut 2 pieces 13"x51 5" Add seam allowances, if using a woven fabric. NOTE: Some of the blue nonwoven fabric is 45" square. Adjust the pattern from \$1.5" down to 45". (8" deep pockets)
- 2. WOVEN FABRIC: Place woven fabric right sides together & sew around all four sides—leaving an opening for turning to the right side. Turn to right side & press flat. Slip stitch opening closed.
- 3. Through both layers attach 3" pieces of Velcro to the BACK—in the position shown in Diagram #2. See photo & diagram above.
- 4. BLUE NONWOVEN FABRIC: Serge/Overcast around the outside edge to hold the 2 layers together & add a decorative effect.
- 5. Fold up Pocket #1 & Pocket #2 (11.5") as shown in Diagram #3.
- 6. Stitch around the two pockets as shown in Diagram #4.
- 7. Fold the walker caddie in half like saddle bags. See photo above. (This photo is hanging over a yardstick.)

Around the middle of December the Center began distribution of the stockings to patients. We delivered around 400 of these stockings and hope that they brought holiday cheer to patients.




Dear Bonnie,

LOCHLAN'S HAT (December 2012 newsletter-page 1)

I received several requests for the pattern for the hat pictured on page one of the December newsletter.

Faith Holcombe was kind enough to provide details:

Size 7 needles

Caron's Simply Soft (Medium)

Cast on 44 stitches.

FLECK STITCH (a multiple of 12)

Rows 1 & 3: Knit

Row 2: Purl

Row 4: k1, p1, across

Faith said that she knits the first 4 stitches, then does 3 repeats of the pattern (36 sts), then knits the last 4 sts. Length of hat: Approx. 4 1/2" (begin decreasing at 4")



Letter to Joanne Huff (Scrub Cap Coordinator, Officers' Wives Club of Frederick) from CPT Reer, who is a physician's assistant at a Mild Traumatic Brain Injury Clinic in Afghanistan, in response to a box of scrub caps (made by Care Wear Volunteers and local individuals). Second note from Joanne to Bonnie.

Joanne,

I want to thank you, the Officers' Wives Club of Frederick (OWC) and Care Wear Volunteers for your gracious support. Many lives were touched by your package. The scrub caps were also passed along by Captain Kinnard to the hospital (role 3) surgical staff. Due to her role at role 3, she seemed to be the best person to pass along the scrub caps. They brought many smiles to the nursing & surgical staff. I have a special request for more scrub caps if this request can be filled. A personal friend of mine is currently the officer in charge of a forward surgical team (FST). Because of their FST capabilities, they provide life sustaining surgical support in a mobile support outside the comforts and safety of our hospital (role 3), therefore they encounter many dangerous situations on a nearly daily basis. This team has some really difficult & emotionally draining situations involving casualties & service members who were severely injured. The decorative scrub caps would be a perfect morale booster to let them know that they are being supported by men & women back at the States.

I would also like to personally thank you for the Christmas gift bags & decorations from you and your family. They help spread the Christmas/Holiday cheer! Thank you again! :) Very respectfully, CPT Theresa Reer

EASY SEAMED RIB-KNIT LARGE PREEMIE/NEWBORN HAT by Rachel Bonitz

(raefahnel@yahoo.com)

This hat came about when I got a new skein of yarn and I started playing with it. I had a 20" circular needle that I like using as straights, no pattern, but I knew I wanted to make a baby hat for the hospital. After I made a couple I decided that it would be a nice pattern to submit to Care Wear Volunteers.

YARN: Soft worsted weight yarn (number 4)

I used Red Heart With Love.

NEEDLES: US size 6 needles,

or a 20" or longer circular to be used as straights.

YARN NEEDLE

Cast on 56 stitches loosely.

Knit one, purl one across. Turn.

Row 2: Knit the knit stitches and purl the purl stitches across. Turn.

Repeat row two for a total of 6".

Decrease as follows:

Decrease row I: Knit 2, purl 2 together across.

Decrease row 2: Knit 2, purl 2 across.

Decrease row 3: Knit 2 together across.

Decrease row 4: Purl back

Decrease row 5: Knit 2 together across.

Break yarn, leaving a 20 to 24 inch tail. Thread onto yarn needle, draw through remaining stitches. Sew seam, reversing seam on the last $1\frac{1}{2}$ " for fold-up brim.

APPLIQUES

Heart appliqués can be used on infant's clothing any time of the year—not just at Valentine's Day. Here is a cute pattern for hearts for you to copy on kimonos, gowns, blankets, etc.... (Full size on page 19.)

SUPPLIES & TOOLS:

- Interlock knit: 1/8 yd each: 2-3 colors for applique
- 3/8 vd Interlock knit print fabric
- 1/4 yd of 1x1 rib
- 12"x12" HeatnBond® Lite
- Gerber® Onesies® garment & knit cap
- Coordinating thread
- Sewing machine, basic sewing supplies
- Iron & pressing surface

DIRECTIONS:Designed for 6 to 9 month size.

APPLIQUED ONESIES® GARMENT & CAP:

- Fuse 4"x4" HeatnBond® piece to wrong side of each solid knit fabric, following manufacturer's instructions.
- 2. Trace pattern; cut 2 large hearts & 2 small hearts from fused knit fabric. Fuse large hearts to front of Onesies® garment and small hearts to front of cap. Straight stitch around hearts at edge.

LEG WARMERS: All seam allowances 1/2". Use small zigzag stitch. RS = Right side(s). WS = Wrong side(s).

CUTTING:

Interlock print: Two 7"x11" leg pieces; two 6"x4" cuff pieces. 1x1 rib: Two 6"x2¾" thigh cuff pieces.

ASSEMBLY:

- 1. Fold leg piece in half lengthwise, RS together. Stitch along long edge. Trim seam; turn RS out.
- 2. Fold ankle cuff in half, RS together to 3"x4". Stitch 4" edge, trim seam, turn RS out.
- 3. Fold cuff piece in half, WS together. RS together & raw edges even, pin ankle cuff to bottom opening of leg piece.

 Stretch cuff piece to fit; stitch & trim.
- 4. RS together & raw edges even, fold thigh cuff in half to 3"x2¾". Stitch along 2¾" edge. Trim & turn RS out.
- 5. Fold thigh cuff in half, WS together. With RS together & raw edges even, pin thigh cuff to top opening of leg piece.

 Stretch 1x1 cuff piece to fit. Trim seam. Repeat for second leg warmer.

HENRY THE HUGGABLE HORSE

MATERIALS: 1 skein Red Heart knitting worsted yarn (#4) *SEE BELOW

Size 7 or 5 knitting needles (smaller size makes tighter and smaller toy)

Stitch holders and markers.

Polyester Fiberfill.

Abbreviations: inc.: increase

k2tog.: Knit 2 together st(s): stitch(stitches)

pm: place marker

EOR: every other row rs: right side

sm:slip marker

bm: before marker

NOTE: BOTH SIDES ARE IDENTICAL. PLEASE MARK THE RIGHT SIDE BECAUSE ALL INCS/DECs. ARE MADE ON THAT SIDE. **DO NOT REMOVE MARKERS UNTIL FINISHED.**

Cast on 56 sts. Work in garter stitch (knit every row) for 3 rows.

Next row:

Knit 26, inc. in next st., pm, knit 2, pm, inc. in next st., knit to end.

Working in garter stitch, inc. 1 stitch before 1st and after 2nd marker EOR 7 times (72 sts.)

LEG SHAPING;

with rs facing, Cast off 13 stitches at the beginning of the next 2 rows, then DECREASE 1 st. each end of EOR twice. (back leg completed) (42 sts.)

Knit the next 14 rows (7 ridges on each side from leg cast on).

INCREASE 1 st. each end of EOR twice, then cast on 13 sts. at beg. of next 2 rows.(72 sts)

HEAD AND NECK SHAPING:

With RS facing, inc. 1 st. before and after markers EOR for 20 rows (10 ridges).(90sts) Bind off 25 sts. beg. of next 2 rows, maintaining incs. on right side before and after markers (42 sts.)

Continue increases each side of markers EOR twice (46 sts.)

CONTINUING HEAD SHAPING AND WITH RS FACING, decrease 1 st. each side or marker EOR 4 times (38 sts.).

Row 1(rs):

K9, k2tog., knit to 2 sts. bm, K2tog., sm, k2, sm, K2tog., K5, K2tog., K.9 (34 sts)

Row 2:

Knit.

Rows 3-8:

Dec. 1 st. each side of marker EOR 3 times (28 sts.)

Row 9:(rs):

K6, k2tog. knit to 2 sts. bm, k2tog.sm, K2, sm, K2tog., K3, K2tog. k.6 (24 sts)

Row 10:

Knit

Rows 11-12:

Dec. 1 st. each side of marker EOR 1 times (22 sts.)

Row 13 (rs)

K4, K2.tog., knit to 2.sts.bm, K2tog.sm, K2,sm, 'K2tog. K2, K2tog.K4 (18 sts)

Row 14:

Knit

Row 15:

K1, K2tog. K3, K2tog. sm., K2, sm, K2tog. K3, K2tog. K1 (14 sts)

Cut yarn, run yarn through stitches, pull tightly and fasten off securely. Fold body in half, sew edges together, stuff from the rear before closing). Tie ribbon around neck. Use your bits and pieces of leftover yarns to make a striped toy. I knit 4 or 6 rows of garter stitch

Use your bits and pieces of leftover yarns to make a striped toy. I knit 4 or 6 rows of garter stitch and two rows of another color/colors. Change color on the right side only. Great way to use up those odd bits and pieces. For an older child, add a mane, eyes and tail. USE #3 NEEDLES and #3 YARN TO MAKE A TOY HALF THE SIZE OF THIS ONE! (SEE PHOTO)

FILE FOR NEXT YEAR!!!!

I thought about saving this pattern until the September 2013 issue of this newsletter, but my filing/ retrieval system is not always successful!!!!

We are not planning to fill stockings for the cancer center again in 2013. Maybe you will find other uses.

SUPPLIES & TOOLS:

- Bernat® Sheep(ish) by Vickie Howell, 1 skein ea:
 (A) Turquoise(ish) and (B) Red(ish) OR (A) Chartreuse(ish) and (B) Hot Pink(ish)
- Size US H-8 crochet hook
- Tapestry needle

DIRECTIONS:

With A, ch 4. Join in rnd with sl st in first ch, taking care not to twist ch.

Rnd 1: Ch 3 (does not count as st). 12 dc in ring. Join with sl st in top of beg ch 3. (12 sts)

Rnd 2: Ch 3. *2 dc in next st. Rep from * ground. Join with sl st in top of beg ch 3. (24 sts)

Rnd 3: Ch 4 (counts as dc and ch 1). Miss next 3 sts. *3 dc in next dc. Ch 1. Miss next 3 sts. Rep from * to last st. 2 dc in same st as ch 4. Join B with sl st in 3rd ch of beg ch 4.

Rnd 4: With B, ch 4. 2 dc in next ch-1 sp. Ch 1. Miss next 3 sts. *3 dc in next ch-1 sp. Ch 1. Miss next 3 sts. Rep from * around. Join A with sl st in 3rd ch of beg ch 4.

Rnd 5: With A, rep 3rd rnd, joining B at end of rnd.

Rnd 6: With B, rep 4th rnd, joining A at end of rnd.

HEEL:

Row 1: With A, ch 4. (Miss next 3 sts. 3 dc in next ch-1 sp. Ch 1) 3 times. Turn. Leave rem sts unworked.

Row 2: Ch 3. Miss next 3 sts. (3 dc in next ch-1 sp. Ch 1. Miss next 3 dc) 3 times. 1 dc in next ch-1 sp. Turn.

Next rnd: Ch 3. 2 dc in next ch-1 sp. *Ch 1. Miss next 3 sts. 3 dc in next ch-1 sp. Rep from * around. Join with sl st in 3rd ch of beg ch 4 (1st row of Heel).

Keeping continuity of established stitch and stripe pattern, rep 3rd and 4th rnds 4 times more.

Next rnd: Ch 3 (counts as dc). 1 dc in next st and each st around. Join with sl st in top of beg ch 3. (20 sts)

Next rnd: Ch 2. 1 hdc in each of next 4 sts. Ch 10 for hanging loop. 1 hdc in same st as last hdc. 1 hdc in each st around. Join with sl st in top of beg ch 2. Fasten off.

Weave in ends. Finished size 5".

ABBREVIATIONS:

beg = beginning

ch = chain

dc = double crochet

rem = remaining

rnd(s) = round(s)

rep = repeat

sc = single crochet

sl st = slip stitch

sp = space

st(s) = stitch(es)

BURIAL GOWNS

Burial Gowns are one of the most requested items from Care Wear Volunteers. See two lovely burial gown patterns (Gown #1 and #2) adapted by Heather Rinkel for Care Wear Volunteers.

These burial items were made by Gaye, Carol, and Heather, Care Wear Volunteers, Petoskey, MI. The collection includes mostly burial items—a much requested item.







PREEMIE BURIAL GOWN #1

To fit a baby weighing approximately 3-4 pounds.

See Photos on page 22

Materials:

1 ball Sensation Cuddle Muffin (self patterning from JoAnn

Stores) (No. 3 Light)

Size 5 needles.

Ribbon

Gauge:

5 sts.=1 inch approx.

Abbreviation: yo = yarn over. Slip first stitch for neater edge.

Cast on 27 stitches loosely.

Rows 1-3:

Knit

Row 4:

Knit 4 (k2, yo) 8 times, Knit 7. (35 stitches).

Row 5:

Knit 4, purl across to last 4 stitches, Knit 4. NOTE: for a tighter

spiral purl all yo's through back of loop, otherwise purl as

normal.

Row 6:

Knit 4 (k3, yo) 8 times, Knit 7.

Row 7:

As row 5.

Repeat rows 6 and 7, increasing on each even row as set, until there are 91 stitches, ending with wrong side facing.

The last increase row will be: K4, (K9, yo) 8 times, Knit 7. (91 sts) Knit next 3 rows (garter stitch).

Row 22:

K14, cast off (loosely) 18 stitches, knit 27, cast off 18 stitches

(loosely), Knit to end. (55 stitches).

Row 23:

Knit

Row 24:

Knit 4, (yo, K2 tog.) to last 5 stitches, yo, K2tog. knit 3.

Row 25:

Knit across.

Row 26:

Knit 7 stitches, increase in each stitch across to last 7 stitches, knit 7. (96 stitches).

Beginning with a purl row and keeping first and last 4 stitches in garter stitch, work in stocking stitch** until gown measures 13" approximately from neck, ending with wrong side facing. Knit 5 rows, cast off.

Work in ends. Attach ribbon to each side at back and thread through eyelet holes, tying bow in front. Add an embellishment at neck if desired.

** Alternative pattern: Work in stocking stitch for 5 rows, ending with right side facing: Row 1: K7*with yarn in front, slip next 5 stitches, with yarn in back K3*., Repeat to last 4 sts. K4. Row 2: K.4, *Purl 5, knit 3.,* repeat from * to last 7 sts., knit 7.Row 3: K9, pick up loose yarn from Row 2 and knit it with next stitch, K.7*, repeat to last 7 sts., pick up loose yarn, K6. Beg. with wrong side, work 4 rows in s.s. keeping first and last 4 sts. in garter stitch.

This is a variation on the Ray of Hope gown. Done on larger needles it should fit a 2-3lb. baby or a 10" chest. See the attached photo. Both of these gowns are done with the "closed" spiral. If you do not use this spiral then the gown will be a bit larger and might need to be knitted longer from neck to feet.

Materials: 1 ball Sensation Cuddle Muffin (self patterning from JoAnn

Stores) No. 3 Light. OR any #3 light yarn.

1 pair Size 5 needles.

Ribbon. Neck trim.

Gauge: 5 sts.= 1 inch. approx.

Abbreviations: yo = yarn over. m1= pick up the loop between the last and

next stitch, knitting into the back of it.,

Note: slip first stitch as if to purl for a more finished edge.

Cast on 27 stitches loosely.

Rows 1-3 Knit

Row 4: Knit 4 (k2,yo) 8 times, knit 7. (35 stitches).

Row 5: Knit 4, purl to last 4 stitches, knit 4. NOTE: for a tighter spiral

purl all yo's through back of loop, otherwise purl as normal.

Row 6: Knit 4 (k3, yo) 8 times, knit 7.

Row 7: As Row 5.

Repeat Rows 6 and 7, increasing on each even row as set, until there are 75 sts. The last increase row will be:

Row 13: Knit 4, (k7, yo) 8 times, knit 7. (75 stitches).

Row 14: (wrong side) Knit

Row 15: Knit

Row 16: Knit

Row 17: Knit 11, cast of 15 (loosely), knit 22, cast off 15 (loosely)

Knit 10 (45 stitches).

Row 18: Knit 4, purl to last 4 stitches, knit 4.

Row 19: Knit 6 (m1, k1) to last 4 stitches, knit 4. (80 stitches).

Row 20: Knit 4, purl to last 4 stitches, knit 4.

Begin pattern: At this point knit yarn overs normally.

Row 1: Knit 4, (K2tog. yo, K3) to last 6 sts. K2tog. yo, K4.

Row 2: Knit 4, (P2tog. yo, P3,) to last 6 sts. P2tog. yo, K4.

Repeat these two rows until 11-12" (or desired length) ending with wrong side facing.

Knit 5 rows garter stitch. Bind off. Work in ends. Add any trim as desired. Cut ribbon into 4 pieces and sew 2 pieces on either side of back edges at the neck and bottom of the yoke. I used 1/8" ribbon as described in the micropreemie burial sacque.

1st row: (RS), 2 sc in 2nd ch from hook, 1 sc in each of next 3 (7) ch. 2 sc in each of next 2 ch. 1 sc in next ch (place marker on last st). 2 sc in each of next 2 ch. 1 sc in each of next 3 (7) ch. 2 sc in last ch. 19 (27) sc. Turn. 2nd row: Ch 1, 2 sc in first sc. 1 sc in each sc to 2 sc before marked sc. 2 sc in each of next 2 sc. 1 sc in marked sc. 2 sc in each of next 2 sc. 1 sc in each sc to last sc, 2 sc in last sc, 25 (33) sts. Turn.

Rep last row 3 times more. 43 (51) sts.

6th row: Ch 2. 1 hdc in each sc to end of row. Turn.

7th row: Ch 2. 1 hdc in first st. *Yoh and draw up a loop around post of next st at front of work inserting hook from right to left. (Yoh and draw through 2 loops on hook) twice - 1 dcfp made. 1 hdc in next st. Rep from * to end. Turn.

8th row: Ch 2.1 hdc in first st. *Yoh and draw up a loop around post of next st at back of work inserting hook from right to left. (Yoh and draw through 2 loops on hook) twice - 1 dcbp made. 1 hdc in next st. Rep from * to end of row. Turn. Rep last 2 rows once more.

Next row: (RS). Ch 2. (1 sc in next st. Dcfp around next st) 5 (7) times. (Miss next st. Dcfp around next st) 12 times. (1 sc in next st. Dcfp around next st) 4 (6) times. 1 sc in last st. Turn. 31 (39) sts.

Next row: (RS). Ch 1. 1 sc in each of first 9 (13) sts. *[(Yoh and draw up a loop around post of next st at back of work inserting hook from right to left. Yoh and draw through 2 loops on hook) twice. Yoh and draw through all loops on hook - dcbptog made] 3 times.* Dcbp around next st. Rep from * to * once. 1 sc in each of last 9 (13) sts. Fasten off.

Strap (make 2).

Ch 33 (40).

1st row: 1 sc in 2nd ch from hook, 1 sc in each ch to end of ch. Turn. 2nd row: Ch 1. 1 sc in first sc. Ch 2. Miss next 2 sc. 1 sc in each sc to end


of row. Turn.

3rd row: Ch 1.1 sc in each sc and 2 sc in ch-2 sp to end of row. Fasten off.

Sew back and sole seam. Sew Strap to Bootie as shown in picture. Sew buttons to correspond to buttonholes.

CARDIGAN, HAT, & MITTS

Cardigan directions are for Size newborn to 3 months; changes for Sizes 6, 12 and 24 months are in parentheses. Hat and Mitts directions are for Size newborn to 3 months; changes for 6 to 12 months are in parentheses.

Light RED HEART® Sport Weight Yarn: See Product List on page 6.

These models made in RED HEART® "Soft Baby™".

Amount-Set of Cardigan, Hat, & Mitts: $5^{1/2}$ (6, $6^{1/2}$, 7) Ounces No. 7881 Powder Blue **CA** and 1/2 (1/2, 1/2, 3/4) ounces No. 7001 White **CB**.

Knitting Needles: 4 mm [US 6].

Six ¹/₂" buttons, sewing needle and thread, 1 stitch holder for cardigan; yarn needle.

GAUGE: 22 sts = 4"; 34 rows = 4" in pat. **CHECK YOUR GAUGE.** Use any size needles to obtain the gauge given.

To Fit Chest: 16 (18, 20, 22)".

Finished Chest Measurement: 191/4 (211/2,

23, 25)" - buttoned.

Hat Circumference: 14 (17¹/₂)".

Mitts Length: 5 (6)".

CARDIGAN

BACK: With **CA**, cast on 53 (59, 63, 69) sts. Marking first row as the right side K 8 rows. Begin pat:

Row 1 (Right Side): K.

Row 2: P1, * K1, P1; rep from * across.

Rep Rows 1 and 2 for pat and work Stripe pat as follows: work 12 more rows with **CA**, then work 2 rows **CB**, [2 rows **CA**, 2 rows **CB**] twice. Cut **CB**. Continue all in **CA** until 9 (10, 11, 12)" from beg, end wrong side row.

Shape Shoulders: Keeping continuity of pat, bind off 17 (19, 21, 23) sts at beg of next 2 rows. Put rem 19 (21, 21, 23) sts on a holder.

LEFT FRONT: With **CA**, cast on 25 (27, 31, 33) sts. Work same as back until $7^{1/2}$ ($8^{1/2}$, $9^{1/2}$, $10^{1/2}$)" from beg, end right side row.

Shape Neck: Keeping continuity of pat, bind off 4 (4, 6, 6) sts at beg of next row. Dec 1 st at neck edge every right side row until 17 (19, 21, 23) sts rem. Work even until front measures same as back to shoulder, end wrong side row. Bind off.

RIGHT FRONT: Work same as left front, reversing shapings by ending wrong side row before neck shaping and ending right side row before binding off at shoulder.

SLEEVES: With **CA**, cast on 31 (33, 37, 39) sts. Work same as back EXCEPT shape sides by inc 1 st each end of 5th pat row, then every 4th row until there are 39 (45, 41, 41) sts, then every 6th row until there are 45 (51, 55, 55) sts, working added sts into pat. Work even until 6 (7, 8, 8¹/₂)" from beg, end wrong side row. Bind off.

FINISHING: Sew shoulder seams. Mark fronts and back 4 (4¹/₂, 5, 5)" down from seams. Place center of sleeve top at shoulder seam and sew in place between markers. Sew side and sleeve seams.

Continued on page 28 Button Band (Worked on right front for boys, left front for girls): With right side facing and CA, pick up and K41 (47, 52, 58) sts across center front edge. K 4 rows. Bind off.

Buttonhole Band: On rem front, mark positions for 6 buttonholes, the top and bottom ¹/₂" from the edge and 4 more evenly spaced between. With **CA**, pick up and K41 (47,52,58) sts across front. K 1 row. **Buttonhole Row:** [K to marker, K2tog, yo] 6 times, K to end.

K 2 more rows. Bind off. Sew buttons to button band to correspond to buttonholes.

COLLAR: With **wrong** side facing and **CA**, omitting last 3 rows of bands, pick up and K15 sts across left front neck edge, K across 19 (21, 21, 23) sts on holder, pick up 15 sts across right front neck edge – 49 (51, 51, 53) sts. K 5 rows.

Next Row: K1 (3,3,5), [K in front and back of next st, K3] 12 times – 61 (63,63,65) sts. K every row until collar measures 1³/₄".

Next Row: K1 (3, 3, 5), [K in front and back of next st, K4] 12 times – 73 (75, 75, 77) sts. Bind off loosely in K.

HAT

With **CA**, cast on 77 (97) sts. Marking first row as the right side, K every row until 1³/₄ (2)" from beg, end wrong side row. Work in pat and Stripe pat same as for Cardigan Back EXCEPT continue all in **CA** until 7 (9)" from beg, end wrong side row.

Shape Top: K1, * sl next 2 sts tog knitwise, K1, pass the 2 slipped sts over the K st; rep from * to last 1 (0) st; K1 (0) - 27 (33) sts. P 1 row.

Next Row: * K3tog; rep from * across – 9 (11) sts. Cut yarn, leaving a long end.

FINISHING: Weave yarn end through rem sts, gather tightly and secure. Sew back seam.

MITTS

With **CA**, cast on 31 (37) sts. Work same as for Cardigan Back EXCEPT continue all in **CA** until 5 (6)" from beg, end wrong side row.

Shape Top: K1, * sl next 2 sts tog knitwise, K1, pass the 2 slipped sts over the K st; rep from across – 11 (13) sts.

Next Row: P1, * P2tog; rep from * across – 6 (7) sts. Cut yarn, leaving a long end.

FINISHING: Weave yarn end through rem sts, gather tightly and secure. Sew back seam.

BLANKET

Blanket measures approximately 32¹/₄" x 37¹/₂".

Light RED HEART® Worsted Weight Yarn: See Product List on page 6.

This model made in RED HEART® "Soft".

Amount: 11 Ounces No. 7881 Powder Blue **CA** and 7 ounces No. 7001 White **CB**.

Knitting Needles: 5 mm [US 8]. Yarn needle.

GAUGE: 20 sts = 4"; 29 rows = 4" in pat. **CHECK YOUR GAUGE.** Use any size needles to obtain the gauge given.

With **CA**, cast on 161 sts. Marking first row as the right side K 4 rows. Begin pat: **Row 1 (Right Side):** K.

Row 2: K3, P1, * K1, P1; rep from * to last 3 sts; K3.

Rep Rows 1 and 2 for pat and work Stripe pat as follows: work 12 more rows with CA, then work * 2 rows CB, [2 rows CA, 2 rows CB] twice, 14 rows CA **, 14 rows CB, 2 rows CA, [2 rows CB, 2 rows CA] twice, 14 rows CB, 14 rows CA; rep from * twice more, then from * to ** once more. K5 rows CA. Bind off.

Blanket measures approximately 36" x 36"; Pillow fits 14" pillow form.

Light RED HEART® Sport Weight Yarn: See Product List on page 6.

These models made in **RED HEART®** "Soft Baby"".

Amount-Blanket: 12 Ounces No. 7321 Powder Yellow **CA** and 5 ounces No. 7001 White **CB**.

Amount-Pillow: 4 Ounces No. 7321 Powder Yellow **CA** and 2 ounces No. 7001 White **CB**.

Crochet Hook: 5 mm [US H-8]. Yarn needle. 14" Pillow form.

GAUGE: Rnds $1-8 = 6^{1/2}$ " across. CHECK YOUR GAUGE. Use any size hook to obtain the gauge.

BLANKET

With $\mathbb{C}\mathbf{A}$, ch 4; join with a sl st to first ch to form a ring.

Rnd 1: Ch 1, 8 sc in ring; join with a sl st to first sc.

Rnd 2: Ch 2, [yo and draw up a lp] 3 times all in same st as joining, yo and draw through all 7 lps on hook – beg puff st made; ch 3; * [yo and draw up a lp] 4 times all in next sc, yo and draw through all 9 lps on hook – puff st made; ch 3; rep from * around; join to top of beg puff st.

Rnd 3: (Sl st, ch 3, 2 dc, ch 2, 3 dc) all in next sp, 3 dc in next sp, * (3 dc, ch 2, 3 dc) all in next sp, 3 dc in next sp; rep from * around; join to top of ch-3. Fasten off.

Rnd 4: Attach CB in any corner ch-2 sp; (ch 3, dc, ch 2, 2 dc) all in sp, dc in each dc to next corner, * (2 dc, ch 2, 2 dc) all in ch-2 sp, dc in each dc to next corner; rep from * around; join. Fasten off.

Rnd 5: With **CA**, rep Rnd 4 EXCEPT do not fasten off.

Rnd 6: SI st in next dc and into sp, (beg puff st, [ch 2, puff st] twice) all in sp, ch 2, skip next 2 dc, * puff st in next dc, ch 2, skip next 2 dc; rep from * to next corner sp **; (puff st, [ch 2, puff st] twice) all in next sp, ch 2, skip next 2 dc; rep from * around, end at **; join to top of beg puff st.

Rnd 7: SI st in next 2 ch; (sI st, ch 3, dc, ch 2, 2 dc) all in puff st, 2 dc in next sp, * dc in next puff st, 2 dc in next sp; rep from * to next corner puff st **; (2 dc, ch 2, 2 dc) all in corner puff st, 2 dc in next sp; rep from * around, end at **; join to top of ch-3. Fasten off.

Rep Rnds 4-7 eight more times. Fasten off.

Border-Rnd 1: With right side facing, attach **CB** in any corner ch-2 sp; ch 1, ** (sc, ch 3, sc) all in sp, ch 3, skip next dc, sc in next dc, * ch 3, skip next 2 dc, sc in next dc; rep from * to 1 dc before next corner; ch 3, skip next dc; rep from ** to last dc before last corner; (ch 1, skip next dc, dc in first sc) to join and form last ch-3 sp.

Rnd 2: ** Ch 3, (sc, ch 3, sc) all in corner ch-3 sp, * ch 3, sc in next sp; rep from * to next corner; rep from ** around; (ch 1, dc in dc) to join and form last ch-3 sp.



Rnds 3-5: * Ch 3, sc in next sp; rep from * to next corner; (sc, ch 3, sc) all in corner ch-3 sp; rep from * around, joining as Rnd 2.

Rnd 6: Rep Rnd 3 EXCEPT work ch 3 for last sp; join with a sl st to dc. Fasten off. Weave in ends.

PILLOW

Make 8 squares: Work Rnds 1-7, then Rnd 4 same as for Blanket.

Sew together 4 squares for front and 4 squares for back.

Edging: With right side facing, attach **CA** and work 1 rnd sc around each large square, working (sc, ch 2, sc) in corners; join to first sc. Fasten off.

Join Front and Back: With wrong sides together and working through both layers at once, attach CA in a corner; ch 1, * (sc, ch 2, sc) all in corner, sc in each sc to next corner; rep from * around inserting pillow form before closing last side; join to first sc. Fasten off.

Border: Attach **CB** in any corner ch-2 sp and work same as for Blanket Border Rnds 1 and 2, adjusting at corners if necessary on Rnd 1, then rep Blanket Border Rnd 6. Fasten off.

Button: With **CA**, work same as Blanket through Rnd 1.

Rnd 2: Work same as Blanket Rnd 2 EXCEPT work ch 2 instead of ch 3 between puff sts.

Rnd 3: Ch 1, 3 sc in each sp around; join to first sc - 24 sc.

Rnds 4 and 5: Ch 1, sc in same st as joining, skip next sc, * sc in next sc, skip next sc; rep from * around; join to first sc – 6 sc at end of Rnd 5. Fasten off, leaving a long end.

Weave yarn through sts of last rnd, pull up firmly to gather, secure with a back stitch. Sew button to center of finished pillow.


